Together in Church again....with some differences

We will not plan on having in-person worship services until the "Green Phase" as designated by the state government at the very earliest. We have a **TENTATIVE** re-opening date of **Sunday**, **July 19, 2020** - if we are in Green and it is safe to worship

together again. We will still be following safety guidelines and some things will need to be completed before this happens as is outlined below.

Pre-arrival things to consider

- If you are sick or think you might be, stay home!
- Bring your mask
- Wash your hands
- Go to the bathroom
- Prepare to practice social distancing
- Bring Only water in a sealable container if needed. Water fountains are going to be unavailable initially
- Remember that there will be no nursery services or children's Sunday School

While in the Building

- 1. Mask wearing will be required. Please wear masks properly covering the mouth and nose and keep it on throughout the entire service (disposable masks will be provided if a person does not have one).
- 2. Ushers will assist in directing and dismissing to maintain Social Distancing
 - a. Pews will be marked off with locations where families can sit.
 - b. Entering and exiting in an orderly fashion to keep everyone's distance.

- 3. No congregational or choral singing will take place (even with masks).
- 4. No greeting will take place (except for people assisting those who enter).
- 5. All hymnals and fellowship folders will be removed from pews.
 - a. all things needed for service will be Projected
- 6. Offering will not be "taken" but can be placed in a basket as a person enters or exits.
- 7. For your safety when Communion is served elements will be provided for each person in prepackaged items. You may bring your own personal "Bread and Wine"
- 8. Please know that when we do open up for worship, we ask that people only come if they feel comfortable doing so. We will either live-stream the service or at least continue to upload video of a portion of the services by Sunday afternoon so that those who remain at home may still join in worship.
- 9. Restrooms will be available near Fellowship Hall. Good advice to use a paper towel to open the restroom door before depositing it in the trash can.
- 10. We will be recording who enters in case we find out that they have been exposed to a person with COVID-19.

Please note that this plan is subject to change as more information becomes available and changes are happening with respect to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

A Note from Worship Team

Pastor Jan, the Leadership Team and the Worship Team are working hard to ensure that our services will be meaningful, fulfilling and spiritually uplifting. We have been blessed with a wonderful, caring congregation. We are looking forward to reopening the building and continuing to reach out to those who

Camp on Wheels and VBS 2020 at WCOTB-July 31- August 7

Friday, July 31 from 6-8pm on the church lawn or Fellowship Hall if there is inclement weather, Camp Swatara will send 1-3 representatives to facilitate activities with the children. We have chosen the following activities: group activities with valuable life lessons such as respect, patience, etc; nature specimens such as bearhide, turtle shell, snake skin fun; Science experiments; fun summer camp classic games; and nature craft. There will be a snack and water for all participants with minimal contact. Pictures will be taken in order to prepare a slide show for the congregation for Sunday, August 9. Children MUST REGISTER by Monday, July 27, in order to give final count to Camp so adequate supplies can be secured. We are asking that a parent or guardian accompany each group of children in order to have more success with social distancing etc. We need a minimum of 10 registrations and maximum of 25 so that we can maintain social distance from family groups and maintain control of the group during activities. Masks will be required by all and there will be 2 hand washing stations and hand sanitizer available. Family groups will be together but 6 feet distance from other children or family groups. This event will serve as the kickoff for VBS which will be by Zoom with the children on Monday, August 3, Wednesday August 5, and Friday, August 7 from 6-7:30PM. Our program will be about 3 parables of Jesus with related activities and games, using favorite songs from previous VBS years. Children will be given boxes with materials, stories, activities, and information for participation. Boxes will be distributed to those attending on July 31. If children can't attend on the 31st but would like to do VBS, boxes will be available to be picked up at the church or could be dropped off at the home if needed. We are hoping parents will send us pictures of their children doing the VBS activities in order to have a presentation to the congregation on **Sunday**, **August 9**. Children will also be encouraged to bring completed VBS projects for display. Our mission project will be preparing Hygiene kits to be taken to New Windsor for distribution. Items will be collected at church when we resume services and a list of items is below.



Wyomissing Church Comes to the Rescue— Demolishes Kitchen

On January 6, 2020, a team from the Wyomissing Church of the Brethren came to the assistance of Brethren Community Ministries. Brethren Community Ministries ("BCM") is the non-profit arm of the Harrisburg First Church of the Brethren, formed to carry out the community ministry activities of the church. BCM engages in numerous community development and welfare activities, including Friday food distribution, non-violence training for teens (Agape-Satyagraha) and computer classes.

BCM also owns a building in the south Allison Hill neighborhood (one of Harrisburg's poorest areas and where Harrisburg First is located) that contains 6 residential apartments, usually leased to low-income, minority people. The apartments are seemingly in constant need of repairs and refurbishment. The complete project was the replacement of kitchen cabinets, counters and sink in one of the units. The cabinets were literally falling off the walls and one of the countertops had collapsed. In order to minimize costs, we hoped to get the old kitchen removed without costs. Dan Biss, Ted Noble, Glenn Pfautz, Scott King, and Ray Dotter (members of self-proclaimed "GRMRG," or Grumpy Retired Men's Repair Group) came to the rescue in January. They handily ripped out the kitchen and helped dispose of the debris. They worked so efficiently that they had time to perform some other small repair jobs in another unit. And they offered to return when another project worthy of their attention popped up. The project was finished up several days later. What a change! And the kitchen is not just more attractive, it's much safer now as well.
